

A Well Defined Body: Appreciating the Bible's Resurrection Language

On Easter morning, worshippers at Zion shouted Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! and sang "Christ has triumphed! He is living!" as we enthusiastically celebrated Christ's bodily resurrection from the dead. Christ's bodily resurrection is the bedrock confession upon which the Christian faith is built. It's therefore essential that we are able to offer a reasoned defense of our chief confession.

One component of such a defense is found in appreciating the meaning of the Bible's claims that Jesus was "raised" and "resurrected." These are hugely significant words, words that carry an entire eschatology¹ with them (which we'll discuss below). For now we need only understand that the Biblical authors weren't simply claiming that a dead man had come back to life (as with Lazarus, the widow's son at Nain, or Jairus' daughter). Neither were they claiming that Jesus' soul had gone to Heaven. And they were certainly not claiming that they had seen a vision of Jesus after His death. Their claims were far bigger and far more surprising. They were saying things that no good Jew would ever have made up, things that rocked their eschatological world. Let's see why.

This Age and the Age to Come

For the Jew, life was essentially divided into two ages: this age and the age to come. This age was marred by Adam's fall and included wars, disease, famine, loss, mourning, grief, and the like. The age to come involved the restoration of Israel, the resurrection of the dead, and the manifestation of the glory of the Kingdom of God. Obviously they, like us, longed for the age to come. We don't have space to go into the nuances of their expectations for the people of Israel (hint: to their surprise, it involved Jesus, an unforeseen plot-twist to rival anything coming out of Hollywood). We'll focus on their resurrection expectations.

For those seeking in-depth studies on the expectations of the people of Israel and the background evidence that supports the conclusions we're getting ready to detail, check out Dr. Jon Levenson's *Resurrection and the Restoration of Israel* and N.T. Wright's definitive *Resurrection of the Son of God.*² Addressing Israel's age-to-come resurrection expectation, Dr. Levenson writes.

It perforce entails embodiedness: people come back in the flesh. But the flesh in which they come back is necessarily different from the kind they knew in their mortal life, for now they have become immune to death and the bodily infirmities associated with it ³

In other words, resurrection meant transformed, deathless *bodies*. And it's important to notice that their focus was not on dying and going to heaven; their focus was on living in resurrected bodies on

the earth. It's absolutely vital to point out that for the Jews this was something that was inextricably connected to the age-to-come. Any talk of resurrection belonged to the age-to-come. N.T. Wright explains, "Resurrection... was thought of as the great event that YHWH [the Lord] would accomplish at the very end of 'the present age', the event which would constitute the 'age to come'..."

And this is why Easter is so surprising! The Biblical writers asserted that Jesus was resurrected. They were using age-to-come language! But they were using it for one man – Jesus. Wright explains why this was so surprising:

Nobody imagined that any individuals had already been raised, or would be raised in advance of the great last day... There are no traditions about a Messiah being raised to life: most Jews of this period hoped for resurrection, many Jews of this period hoped for a Messiah, but nobody put those two hopes together until the early Christians do so.⁴

Make sure you understand what you just read. The apostolic claim that Jesus had been raised from the dead was utterly surprising and filled with eschatological (i.e. end times / age to come) implications. This is important to appreciate because it's a key piece in our case for the historical reality of the bodily resurrection of Jesus.

Why is it important?

Appreciating the apostolic claim to the bodily resurrection of Jesus and its age-to-come implications is important because it not only helps us to appreciate the great significance of the event, but it also equips us to defeat two of today's

most common attacks on Christ's bodily resurrection.

The first attack accuses early Christians of stealing the idea of resurrection from various pagan myths of dying and rising gods – Jesus was a copycat savior. The second attack claims that the apostles were merely trying to describe their visions/experiences of Jesus after His death. Both attacks are defeated by the evidence. Let's see how.

Copycat splat

One of the more popular attacks on the bodily resurrection of Jesus is currently underway in the internet's virtual blogospheric world. It goes like this: The early Christians made up Jesus's resurrection from a patchwork of ideas that they stole from various pagan religions of dying and rising gods. And to "prove" their point they trot out a handful of pagan myths supposedly about dying and rising gods. It all sounds plausible in the evidence-thin air of the blogosphere until you come back down and breathe the evidence-thick air of reality.

In fact, the evidence against the copycat savior theory is so non-existent that Biblical scholar Bart Ehrman, the self-described "agnostic leaning toward atheism," wrote a book in which he shot the copycat theory out of the air. First, he points out that there is no evidence anywhere for pre-Christ pagan notions of dying and rising gods; the stuff bloggers trot out has been ripped out of context and misunderstood. Second, he acknowledges the precise point we made earlier, that the apostolic confession of resurrection was rooted in Jewish age-to-come expectations. When the

copycat savior theory encounters the evidence, it goes splat.

At a loss for words

The second attack, which sadly comes from many pulpits today, goes something like this: After Jesus was crucified, the apostles were overcome with grief. But on Easter morning Peter, and perhaps others, received a vision of Jesus or had some sort of spiritual (as in "non-bodily") experience of Jesus, and they were at a loss for words to describe it. The best they could come up with was "resurrection."

If the disciples had not encountered the physical, flesh and bones body of Jesus after His death they would never – as in N.E.V.E.R. – have said that He was resurrected.

But recall what "resurrection" meant! It carried the entire age to come with it! If the disciples had not encountered the physical, flesh and bones body of Jesus after His death they would never – as in N.E.V.E.R. – have said that He was resurrected. They had words to describe visions and they had words to describe overwhelming experiences. They didn't use those words. They used very specific and very loaded terms.

What's it all mean?

What does all this mean for us? At least two things: 1) The historical case for the bodily resurrection of Jesus is solid and robust. And this means that the promise of our coming bodily resurrection is solid and robust, too. Like Jesus, we will be raised with bodies immune to death.

2) The bodily resurrection of Jesus is bigger than a dead man coming back to life and even bigger than a mere future promise for us. Remember what "resurrection" meant — it was inextricably connected to the age to come. So, if Jesus has been resurrected, it means He has brought the age to come with Him! It means that the age-to-come reign of God has come into our midst in Christ and we are invited to enjoy the blessings of this reign in an initial way even now.

God's age-to-come new creation has broken into our fallen age in Christ and through the preaching of the gospel of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection sinners are being forgiven and made new!


N.T. Wright, in his book *Surprised by Hope*, puts it this way: "Easter functions as the beginning of the new creation." And that's why Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5, "If anyone is in Christ, He is a new creation." God's age-to-come new creation has broken into our fallen age in Christ. Through the preaching of the Gospel of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection, sinners are being forgiven and made new! It's no wonder we shout *Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!* — Pastor Conner




Disconnected Segments

In a recent conversation, somebody made the observation that it is all too easy to disconnect one segment or part of our life from another part. They went on saying, "It's like we have our work life, our family life, and our church life, but they're all disconnected." I think they were wrestling with our inability to mesh these significant components of our lives into one.

For instance, we all know that our connection to Jesus matters, but does that segment of our life relate to our work or even our politics? So, it's almost as if we enter our Christian life once we enter Zion or Trinity and slide into our rear pew; once we're done with worship, we move into our family life and go out to eat. Then at work, we complete "work-y" things, but it's easy to disconnect what we heard Saturday/Sunday with filling out forms at our desk.



Pastor Martin Luther, however, saw connection between all of these areas of our lives. In our Small Catechism Luther did the ancient equivalent of copying and pasting Bible verses which related to various segments of everyday life in the *Table* of Duties. In other words, he related our Church or Christian life to every other aspect of our living; he didn't disconnect them or at the very least he demonstrated how the Christian faith has ALWAYS connected daily living with Christ rather than disconnecting them.



Take a look at one of the ways Luther connected being an employer or supervisor (work life) to Christ (Christian life) from Ephesians 6:9:

"Masters, do the same to them [slaves], and stop your threatening, knowing that he who is both their Master and yours is in heaven, and that there is no partiality with him."

How does being connected to Christ affect how you treat your employees? You won't threaten them, abuse them, mistreat them, make them stay late at the expense of their families, lie to them about when you're going to pay them, or fail to appreciate their work. Why? Because you have the same God as your employee. Just because you have some status that does not allow you to

get away with poor treatment. God sees how you deal with your people. But on top of that, if Christ – the Master of the Universe – was willing to work and die for you even though you are nothing in comparison to Him – how much more can you appreciate and honor your employees?



Words matter. Even more, as we've so often emphasized in this newsletter, in our daily online teaching time, our Bible studies, and our Sunday sermons, the *meaning* of words matters. We've compared words to filled donuts; it matters what's inside. If it's icing, we're golden. If it's mustard, we're sunk.

We will make that point again here. If you've been listening carefully to the current cultural conversation, you've noticed a sinister sleight of hand happening right below our noses with the word equality. Suddenly and surreptitiously, it has become equity.

And the change matters. A lot.

Listen attentively and you will hear it from woke⁵ corporate ideologues, politicians, pundits, White House spokespersons, even from the highest office in our nation. What does it mean and why should Christians be concerned? Read on.

In brief, *equality* is concerned with equal opportunity, whereas, *equity* insists on equal results. The difference is chasmic.

Equality sees individuals and their inherent dignity and their shared humanity and seeks to treat every person accordingly, giving each individual the same opportunity to participate and succeed (or fail) and holding each person accountable for his or her individual actions. As Christians, we would emphasize our shared status as image bearing creatures of God. This reality demands equal opportunity and equal justice based on an individual's actions. ⁶

Equity does not see individuals; it sees groups. Individuals are assigned to groups that are differentiated by race, sexual orientation, gender identity, wealth, power, privilege, etc. Equity wants every group to experience the same outcomes in society, to have equitable/proportionate representation on boards, in schools, on committees, in departments, etc.

Baked into equity are assumptions about justice. Whereas, as mentioned above, equality seeks to ensure equal access for individuals and to hold each individual accountable for his or her actions under a moral code that applies equally to all, equity wants to level groups. Those emphasizing equity assume that the mere existence of disparity (difference) among groups demonstrates discrimination and injustice.

So, for instance, a corporate board or committee or private school, for instance, that doesn't mirror the racial diversity of America or its community is

Scripture does not segregate people this way. Scripture acknowledges a person's distinctive ethnicity and people group, but it grounds identity in our shared status as image-bearing creatures of God. This is primary. Further, Scripture does not ground identity in sexual orientation or gender identity (internal desires or beliefs); it grounds it in our sexed bodies as male or female.

assumed to be racist and guilty of inequity. A company that doesn't have equitable/proportionate representation of transgender individuals or same-sex attracted individuals is identified as bigoted and guilty of inequity. For woke ideology, disparity of representation equals discrimination.

This is not only utterly simplistic and spectacularly shortsighted, but it results in inequality (thus this article's title!), as we will see. First, woke ideologues, insisting on equity, refuse to accept the multiplicity of reasons that may explain disparity in outcomes. For them, different outcomes among groups is the result of one thing and one thing only: social injustice (specifically racial or sexual/gender injustice). They have only one tool in their tool box – a social justice hammer - so everything they see is a socially unjust nail to be clobbered. So, they spend their energies hunting down and demonizing boards, schools, organizations, groups, etc. that have a disparate representation of the groups they've identified as unjustly underrepresented.

Is it possible that discrimination could explain disparity among group representation? Yes. Each situation would need to be considered individually. But it's also possible, and far more likely, that different groups have different attainments because they have different aspirations. In other words, not every group has the same priorities and goals. This should be painfully obvious, but seems to be missed by equity advocates today who are more concerned about the world as they want to see it (through oppressive racial/sexual lenses), than the world as it really is (full of diverse individuals and groups driven by different priorities).

You often see this in the way woke equity disciples frame gender wage disparities. They demonize wage disparity between men and women,

concluding that such difference proves that corporations and/or political parties are sexist and discriminating against women. When you adjust for the more complex reality, however, other explanations start to emerge. Women get married and have babies. Many of them choose to exit the workforce for a time or to work part-time while they are raising children. These realities are included in their wage gap figures.

When you consider never-married women, women who have not exited the workforce or temporarily gone to part-time, the wage gap disappears, as does the narrative of injustice. As mentioned above, not every group has the same priorities and goals.

Or consider medical professions. According to a recent study, men account for 85% of residents in orthopedic surgery, 74% in diagnostic surgery, 68% in nuclear medicine, and 65% in anesthesiology. And women accounted for 83% of residents in obstetrics and gynecology, 73% in pediatrics, 64% in dermatology.

These are significant disparities. The distribution of men and women among medical fields is not equitable. Does that mean that some sort of systemic discrimination is in play, that women are systemically being excluded from orthopedic surgery or men from pediatrics? Maybe. Or, is it possible different groups have different priorities and goals? Is it possible men and women have different natural tendencies that affect their career paths?

Or consider an ironic example, one of woke ideology's most ardent acolytes: Google. Google famously fired one of its engineers for suggesting what we've just demonstrated, that different groups have different aspirations and inclinations, and as a result, different representational outcomes. But Google's own technological

department demonstrates dramatic inequity: 41% are Asian, 21% are women, 3% are Hispanic, and just under 2% are black.

What are we to make of this? Is Google racist or sexist? Maybe. Or is it more likely that different groups of people, for a whole host of complicated reasons (historical, societal, geographical, and many, many more) have different aspirations?

This answer is unacceptable for equity advocates. Instead, they insist that equity must be forced. Ibram X. Kendi,⁸ a very prominent woke disciple and author of *How to be an Antiracist*, writes,

If discrimination is creating equity, then it is antiracist. If discrimination is creating inequity, then it is racist... The only remedy to racist discrimination is antiracist discrimination. The only remedy to past discrimination is present discrimination. The only remedy is present discrimination is future discrimination.

In other words, if discrimination is forcing equitable/proportionate representation on boards, committees, schools, departments, etc., then it is good. This is what pundits, politicians, board presidents, and woke CEOs mean by *equity*. Equity should be forced on boards, schools, departments, etc. They should be forced to have an equitable/proportionate representation of men and women, trans individuals, same-sex orientated individuals, ethnic groups, etc.

In order to do this, though, they would have to elevate group identity above individual qualifications. Consider the medical professionals mentioned above. If equity was enforced, hospitals would be required to hire, not based on qualifications and skill, but based on group identity (female, trans, black, etc.). The more qualified

doctor may be discriminated against because he belonged to the wrong group, and the less qualified one could end up operating on you or your loved one. And the advocates of equity would consider this good. Equal opportunity evaporates beneath the blazing heat of equity's sun.

Should schools hire teachers based upon individual competence and ability or upon group identity? Equity says the latter. What about Google? Should they hire based upon skill or group identity? Equity says the latter. Equity says proportionate representation must be achieved even if it means discriminating against more qualified individuals. Equal opportunity gets pushed to the back of the bus when equity gets on.

This is not just. Scripture calls this "showing partiality" and repeatedly condemns it:

- You shall not be partial in judgment (Deuteronomy 1:17).
- To show partiality is not good... (Proverbs 28:21)
- You shall do no injustice in court. You shall not be partial to the poor or defer to the great, but in righteousness shall you judge your neighbor" (Leviticus 19:15).
- My brothers, show no partiality as you hold the faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory (James 2:1).

In other words, an equal and just measure should be used for each individual. This is just. Equity is not. Equity extols partiality and produces inequality. We need to pay attention to words because words matter. Equity and Equality are not equal. Words matter. A lot. – Pastor Conner

Preschool Praises for April 2021

We love April because we get to teach the children about Jesus' resurrection and it starts to get nicer out and we can run around outside more!

The first week of April we studied the numbers 5 & 6 and continued learning about plants. We finished our study of the bean seeds and the children loved getting to see how big their seed grew. The children worked on their fine motor skills by drawing lines between matching pictures. We also made a picture of the parts of a flower which has been hanging in the church entry this month for all to enjoy. Jesus Time was about how, on the day of the Resurrection, Jesus joined a couple of his disciples on the road while they walked to Emmaus. They did not realize it was Jesus as they explained to him why they were so upset as the man they believed to be the Christ had died by crucifixion. Jesus then went on to explain the scriptures to them and how it all was about Jesus. Then, that evening as he joined them for supper. God allowed them to see Jesus as he broke the bread and he instantly disappeared! The disciples were so amazed that they ran all the way back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples what had happened. Pastor spoke to the children about why we celebrate Easter and how Jesus' resurrection is such a wonderful thing for all of us! Jesus wasn't just a man, he was God and his promises will always come true. One day we will live with him in our resurrected bodies on the New Earth!







The second week of April was the Week of the Young Child and each day we had a different fun activity. Tuesday was wacky hair day, Wednesday was pajama day and Friday was bring your favorite stuffy (of reasonable size). All the stories I read were classics and they really loved The Three Billy Goats Gruff! We worked on the numbers 7 & 8, the letter D and learned about rectangles. They loved getting to paint pictures and practice their scissor skills by cutting tricky curved and jagged lines. During Jesus Time we talked about how Jesus visited the disciples the day of his resurrection as they huddled scared in a locked room. Thomas, one of the disciples, was not there when Jesus visited and wouldn't believe that he was alive. When Jesus returned a week later, Thomas finally believed. Jesus said, "Blessed are those who have not seen, yet believe." That's us! Jesus calls us blessed! Pastor told the children about when two disciples were walking on the road to Emmaus and were approached by a man who told them how the scriptures were all about Jesus - they later found out that it was Jesus alive again!

The third week we studied transportation and the children got to bring 2 pictures of different forms of transportation which we then categorized into land, water and air forms. We also studied numbers 9 & 10 and reviewed circle. square, triangle and rectangle. The children loved painting with different rollers that made different tracks. During Jesus Time we talked about how Jesus visited the disciples in Galilee when they were fishing all night but hadn't caught anything. They didn't know it was Jesus on the shore who asked if they had caught any fish. When they replied that they hadn't, he told them to cast their net on the right side of the boat - they then caught so many fish they couldn't reel in the net! At this point Peter realized it was Jesus and swam all the way to shore to go to him! They then all ate fish for breakfast with the resurrected Christ! Pastor spoke to the children about Thomas and how his disbelief shows how blessed we are since, although we have not seen, we believe!

The fourth week of April we reviewed the numbers 1-10 and learned about bugs! We learned how to tell if a bug is an insect or not and began working on our presents for mother's day. We read the story The Very Hungry Caterpillar and cut out and sequenced the foods in order according to the story. During Jesus Time we talked about Jesus' bodily ascension into heaven and the promise that he will return and then we will be able to join Him bodily in heaven with God the Father and the Holy Spirit! What a wonderful hope to have! Pastor spoke to the children about how Jesus said that he was the door to salvation which means that we enter eternal life through Jesus, and He said that He was The Good Shepherd that lays down His life for the sheep. We are the sheep and Jesus cares for us by giving us forgiveness, grace, mercy, and eternal life by dying on the cross and taking the justice that we deserve for our sins.

Stinkin' Thinkin'

You've heard parents and teachers, referring to a child's volume, instruct him, "Use your inside voice." For the next few paragraphs, we're going to consider your "inside voice," but we're not referring to the volume of your voice, we're referring to the voice echoing in your mind, the voice that often loops in your mind narrating your daily experiences. It guides your behavior and influences the way you interact with others. It plays a major role in how you feel about yourself, other people, and the world in general.



Sometimes these thoughts get out of line with reality, becoming irrational and leading to communication issues, relationship problems, and unhealthy decisions. These thoughts, therefore, must be trained, in line with God's Word and truth, to think and narrate in line with reality, lest we rehearse and repeat falsehood upon falsehood negatively impacting our mental health, our lives, and others'. Below are several examples of irrational inside voices and suggestions for how to bring the external truth of God's voice to bear on them.

- 1. All or nothing This inside voice wants to see things in extreme categories. Something is either a complete success or a complete failure. Something can only be your way or no way. Reality rarely functions this way. Learning to think in nuance, while difficult, is helpful. It helps you to be honest about successes and failures, not being blind to shades of success or unseeing of shadows of shortcomings. Another person may not be completely wrong. You probably aren't a complete failure. Your family probably isn't a total disaster. That's all or nothing thinking and it's rarely true. The external voice of truth (that echoes in God's Word) teaches us to see the world through the lens of sobriety and charity, being honest about the nuances of life.
- 2. **Overgeneralizing** This inside voice takes life events and generalizes them across the horizon of your life. So, one member of your family treats you poorly and you conclude, "Everyone in my family is rude." It's as if you take a snapshot of one unfortunate or unpleasant incident and magnify it into the totality of reality, but that's not rational. No snapshot can capture the totality of reality; it can only capture one brief slice. We must learn to think in video, not snapshots. No one frame defines the entire video; it must be viewed as a whole. Doing this helps us adopt a balanced perspective on life and our relationships.
- 3. Filtering Out the Positive This inside voice exhorts us to fixate on the negative, to avert our eyes from the many positive things that happen during the day, to filter them out as if they didn't happen and don't exist. But God's grace is real and present even in the worst circumstances and in the biggest failures, from the provision of your daily bread to the unshakable inheritance of God's kingdom that you have in Christ. The negatives may be real, but they don't cancel the real and present daily positives of God.
- 4. **Mind-Reading** This inside voice tempts us to believe that we can know what somebody else is thinking, that we can rightly divine what is motivating a person's actions. But this power belongs to no creature, only to the Creator. We must hear the external voice of truth: we are limited creatures. We must acknowledge our finitude and ignorance. This teaches humility and enables us to be charitable toward others. It may also give us the courage to ask people what they're thinking, rather than assuming we know.

- 5. Catastrophizing This inside voice writes the end of the story far in advance of its actual ending, and it writes it in the worst way imaginable. It's the Chicken Little syndrome, but a bump on the head doesn't mean the sky is necessarily falling. An apple may have left a bruise on your head, and there may be more falling apples on their way, but God hasn't ceased being God. His promises haven't become untrue because you got pummeled by falling fruit. God promises grace sufficient for each day (and moment!). Catastrophizing writes a future devoid of His grace. We must hear the external voice of truth in God's Word to be reminded of God's daily grace.
- 6. Emotional Reasoning This inside voice urges is to pedal in emotions (fear, anger, happiness, etc.) and not reason and thought. We forget that it is impossible to have a feeling that isn't preceded by and built upon beliefs, founded upon what we believe to be true about the world and/or a situation. What you believe affects what you feel affects what you do. The external voice of truth encourages us to examine our beliefs, the thoughts we have about reality and/or a situation. Are our thoughts/beliefs true? If not, our emotions will not be true either. This doesn't mean emotions are invalid; it means emotions are not king. They cannot rule our minds. Truth must and this truth comes from beyond us.
- 7. Labeling This inside voice tries to get us to identify people with things we don't like about them, to get us to label them "stupid" or "mean" or "liberal" or with any other overly simplistic designation. Their entire identity is subsumed beneath the label. But this keeps us from seeing people as people, complex and capable, foolish and fallen, loved and cherished. The external voice of truth must remind us that, no matter our personal opinion of a person, he or she bears the image of God and should be seen as such. We should see people holistically and not as labels.
- 8. **Personalization** This inside voice wants you to wrap the universe around you, to become a gravity-bending black hole that cannot see beyond yourself. So, a friend doesn't call you back and this voice says, "She's mad at you. He's ignoring you." That may be true, but there are many, many more possible reasons and most of them have nothing to do with you. The external voice of truth bends you outward into the lives of others, teaching you to see their circumstances, their struggles, their life situations.

The inside voice needs to be trained by the external voice of truth, a voice that echoes in Scripture, in Church, and even in creation. Want help training? It's available!
