Rightly Punctuating Emotions. You Have More Control Over Them than You Think.







With three kids running cross country, Rebecca and I see a lot of slogans on t-shirts. Here's a smattering of the more common ones:

- "Who's going to carry the boats?"
- "The faster you run the sooner you're done."
- "Our sport is your sport's punishment."
- "Pain is weakness leaving the body."
- "XC: Where success is measured by your own improvement."

At a recent meet, I saw this simple statement on the back of a shirt: "I choose to be happy." I've seen it before, and while it can surely be stretched to its breaking point, it presents an element of truth: we have more control over our emotions than we think. We may not have control over our life circumstances (and we'll say more about this in a moment), but we are not powerless peons who must yield to the impulses of our emotions.

Think of our emotions as punctuation marks. We tend to punctuate our emotions with a period or an exclamation point. In other words, we simply accept them as the final word (the period), so an experience over which we have no control, or as a cause for alarm, even panic (the exclamation point), but emotions should really be punctuated with a question mark. They invite us to ask: *This thing is happening. How do I deal with it? How do I respond? How do I bring my worldview to bear?*

Pay special attention to that last question. How do I bring my worldview to bear in whatever circumstance lies behind the feeling? Here's why this is important: The story we tell ourselves governs the emotions we experience. This is an exceedingly important insight. All of us interpret the world through the framework of the story that we tell ourselves. So the real question is, What story are we telling ourselves?

Do we live in a Godless world devoid of meaning, morality, and purpose? Do we live in a world in which God, if He's real, is too distant or distracted to notice or care about the happenings in our life? Do we live in a world where our happiness is the most important thing? Do we live in a world where God is waiting for us to show enough faith and sacrifice for Him to act? Do we live in a world where God expects us to discern His will through intuitions and signs? Are we alone, abandoned, forgotten?

How we answer these questions will affect what we do with our emotions. As we've shared in previous articles, what we believe to be true about God and reality affects our feelings and this affects what we do. So, to get to the place where we can begin to exercise thoughtful control over our emotions, to the place where the statement *I choose to be happy* becomes a real possibility, we have to get our beliefs to align with what is true about God and reality.

Here are a few key texts from Scripture to help us in this endeavor. Consider carefully what these texts say about God and reality.

- In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth, Genesis 1:1
- The LORD by wisdom founded the earth; by understanding he established the heavens... Proverbs 3:19

- "Who has made man's mouth? Who makes him mute, or deaf, or seeing, or blind? Is it not I, the LORD?" Exodus 4:11
- God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.
 Therefore we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea... Psalm 46:1-2
- Jesus said, "Out of the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, sexual immorality, theft, false witness, slander."
 Matthew 15:19
- Jesus said, "This is eternal life, that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent." John 17:3
- Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. 1 Peter 4:12
- God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Romans 5:8
- Jesus said, "In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world." John 16:33
- For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. Romans 8:18

To summarize: God is the Creator (we are the creatures, and fallen, sinful ones at that). He governs by wisdom (a wisdom as beyond our understanding as conceptualizing every star in the night sky as one unified constellation is beyond our understanding). Suffering is real and not

inconsistent with God's wise governing. Happiness isn't the highest good (knowing God and being known by God is). We have great purpose in our God-given vocations in which we have tremendous freedom to choose. God is simultaneously transcendent (above and over everything) and immanent (near to us in His mediated grace). God acts first; He doesn't make us earn His favor or provision. We live in the age of suffering and death. This is normal in this age (not okay, but normal), but the age to come will banish the age of suffering and death and usher in the age of life and eternal joy.

This is true. This is who God is. This is reality. And we must hear it and repeat it again and again and again to ensure that the story we're telling ourselves is true. Only then will we have any chance of governing our emotions.

Let's imagine a couple scenarios. Scenario one: You lose your job. Maybe your position was eliminated. Maybe you were fired. Maybe it was some other scenario. Obviously, there are going to be some powerful emotions involved. Remember, these emotions are punctuation marks. If we treat them like a period or an exclamation point, we will let them control us (and likely forget to bring our Biblically informed worldview to bear). If, however, we treat them like a question mark, we can see how they drive us to our worldview. How does my worldview speak to this situation?

Notice in our scenario that you likely had no control over losing your job. So as we said earlier, we often have little control over our specific life circumstances, but if we treat our emotions like a question mark that invite us to bring our worldview to bear on the situation, we will realize that we do have control over what we do with our emotions.

Unfortunately, many people tend to treat their emotions like periods and exclamation points. Think of the *period* crowd as Eeyore. They glumly bow to their gloom, believing their emotions to be the final, depressing, word on reality. They don't believe they could choose to be happy.

And think of the exclamation point crowd as Chicken Little. The sky is always falling. This is called catastrophizing. So, in our scenario the individual would attach catastrophic ideas or images to the losing of his job – My life is over! I can't face the world! I'm going to go bankrupt! Disaster! The sky is falling! This shouldn't ever happen!

But ask yourself, *Is that true?* Given what we know about God and reality, are the conclusions of the Eeyores and Chicken Littles true? Of course not. Losing your job, while exceedingly unpleasant and likely beyond your control, is not inconsistent with the way the world is or with the wise governing of God. So, you could lose your job, but you can't lose God's promises to you in Jesus (God doesn't take them back). God remains sovereign. His promises remain true. So when your emotions ask you what your worldview has to say about the situation, you can tell them.

Scenario two: You receive an unexpected medical diagnosis. Maybe it's career altering. Maybe it's life-changing. Maybe it's life threatening. These are all exceedingly unpleasant realities and sure to bring intense emotions. As before, we must recognize that our emotions aren't periods or exclamation points, they are question marks that drive us to our worldview. Where does my scenario live in reality? Where does my scenario live in God's wise governance? Where does my scenario live in God's promises? These questions will drive you into your worldview, into God's Word, and into God's promises, which is exactly

what you want. And this will help you choose your response.

Perhaps an image will help. When you're experiencing big emotions, mentally imagine yourself in a theatre. You are watching yourself on stage (this obviously involves your imagination!). How is the person on stage responding to his emotions? Is she treating them like a period or an exclamation point or a question mark? What does the person on stage need to hear? What truth about God or reality does she need to hear? What promise does he need to hear?

Now, tell them. Speak truth into their life. Confess reality to them. Tell them who God is and what His promises are. In other words, speak truth into your life (the truth you have heard and rehearsed in God's Word). You may even find it helpful to speak truth out loud to yourself. Some have also found great assistance in journaling, in recording their life circumstances and the emotions they initially experienced with them and how they spoke truth into those emotions. This allows them to reflect on their reflections, to think about their thoughts, which allows them to bring perspective and truth into their life.

Going back to the t-shirt slogan *I choose to be happy*. It doesn't have to remain a slogan on a t-shirt; it's actually a practice you can adopt. It doesn't mean you will only experience happy emotions; it means you get to speak Christian truth into your circumstances and the Christian truth is centered in the good news, (dare we even say *happy* news?) of Jesus Christ. To get there, though, we must first learn how rightly to punctuate our emotions. If you'd like to visit more about this, come talk to me. 7 Things Your Seven-Year-Old Should Know about Love and Sex by Marilyn Evans September 19, 2023

We live in the age of information. We also live in a hyper-sexualized era. Put those two together and you quickly realize there are ideas filtering through our cultural climate that you wouldn't expect a seven-year-old should know.

The information kids receive can be upsetting, disturbing, confusing and unhealthy. It can also spark questions and curiosity. Often kids turn to unreliable and dangerous sources, like pornography, for answers. Dr. Asma J. Chattha, M.B.B.S., pediatrician at Mayo Clinic Children's Center explained, "it is all the more important to have these conversations with our children earlier than we thought."

One of the best ways parents can inoculate kids from turning to the internet with their questions is to have *frequent*, *layered conversations about love*, sex, *and intimacy in the home*. Today we'll discuss 7 essentials we think parents should include to help protect kids from the harms of pornography and sexual predators.

Our read-aloud books make room for more conversation

Parents tell us one of the reasons they love the *Good Pictures Bad Pictures* books is that these books allow you to teach young children to reject pornography without broaching the subject of sex.

That's because we know parents want to bring up the topic of sex in their own way and according to their child's needs. We think parents are the best people to teach their kids about sex. As you read on, please consider the points below as guidelines around which you can frame your family values.

7 essentials your seven-year-old should know about love and sex

1. A seven-year-old should be able to name all their body parts (and know how special their body is)

In *Good Pictures Bad Pictures Jr.* kids learn, "every part of your body is good, including private parts. But taking pictures of them is *not* good."

Young children are fascinated by how the body works. Parents can capitalize on a child's inquisitive nature by helping them identify the correct names of all their body parts (private and not private) from a very young age.

When kids know that every part of their body is important it helps them develop a good self-image and have greater respect for others. Knowing the correct names of body parts can also help protect children from sexual abuse!

Giving kids the correct vocabulary to express themselves promotes health and safety. Think about it, a child should feel as comfortable telling their parents, "My vagina is hurting" as they would "I scratched my elbow."

Tip: Remind kids that the one of the most amazing parts of their body is the brain. This helps kids focus on more than just physical appearance.

2. A seven-year-old should know where babies come from

Once children learn the correct names of their body, it's a pretty natural transition to talk about where babies come from. Remember this doesn't need to be tackled in just one sitting. Find out what your child knows first. Then help them fill in missing details.

Some kids naturally ask, others won't. I had one like that. Finally I said, "Ok you're old enough that you might hear kids at school spreading some strange ideas about sex. Let's make sure you've got the facts straight."

I asked him what he knew. He had some general concepts that when pieced together would have made a strange looking baby. LOL! But with a bit of prodding, we talked about not just the scientific facts (sperm meets eggs) but also, what it means to be in love, married, and creating a family.

3. A seven-year-old can know that moms and dads have sex

When I was seven, I'm pretty sure I convinced myself that babies automatically appeared when people got married. My parents had four kids, so logically they must have been married four times! Funny then, but today I might have Googled the answer!

Of course kids shouldn't know intimate details of their parent's sex life. But they can know that parents do have sex. It's even Ok that kids know sex is an expression of married love. This will

help kids understand that there is an appropriate time and place for sexual intimacy in relationships.

And when kids know their parents have sex it helps remove any shame or embarrassment kids might feel about the subject of sex. Which means they'll be more likely to go to their parents with questions they have, rather than look for information in secret.

4. A seven-year-old should know about different kinds of love (friends, family, romance)

This year my 9-year-old son received a note from a secret admirer. It read, "I ♥ U ... and have since second grade!"

I wasn't sure if my son would be flattered or run for the hills. Either way, this was serious business. Plus we had the tender feelings of a young girl to consider. I used this as an opportunity to talk to my son about girls, crushes and different kinds of love.

My son and I were pretty certain we knew who his admirer was. "Well this girl seems to like you a lot." I said. "What do you think about that?" He let out a big sigh and then blurted, "The girls all think they should have a boyfriend mom! That's stupid!" After a fun chat we decided at his age it's good to have girls that are your friends ('cause girls are cool, too!). But they don't need to be your *girlfriend*. Then we continued to talk about why (when he's much older), it will make sense to date and maybe even have a girlfriend ...one day!

5. A seven-year-old should know why love should always be a part of sex

Whoa, whoa, whoa! ...Already? Actually, this is the number one reason your kids need *you* to talk to them about sex. That's because 99% of

the information your kids will gather about sex outside your home will fail to acknowledge that love is even a consideration!

At school, your kids might learn about sex through the lens of biology, anatomy, social studies, health, consent, contraception, gender identity, etc. But most schools won't touch on love and the emotional consequences (good and bad) that come with the act of sex.

We live in a cultural environment that promotes sex as something separate and distinct from love. It's important that children learn from their parents that relationships grow over time. And that sex should be reserved for adults, like moms and dads, who know they *love* each other very much. Imagine the instances of sexual exploitation that would be avoided if more people grasped this concept!


6. A seven-year-old should know why pornography is bad

In today's digital reality parents cannot control when or how their child could be exposed to all sorts of highly sexualized imagery. By age seven your child is ready to sit down with you and have a serious conversation about pornography. We know that can feel like a daunting task, which is exactly why we recommend Good Pictures Bad Pictures: Porn-Proofing Today's Young Kids as a way to get the conversation going.

In this beautifully written and illustrated picture book parents and children learn together:

- How to define and recognize pornography
- How pornography acts like a magnet to look again
- How pornography tricks the brain into addiction
- How to help your brain reject pornography






When parents talk to children about pornography it's good to mention that all humans deserve to be loved and treated with kindness. **Pornography is the opposite of love**. It takes something that is meant to be good and turns it into something very bad.

7. A seven-year-old should know where to go to find ANY answer about love and sex In an earlier post, *Will I Rob My Child's Innocence If I start talking about the Dangers of Porn*, Kristen explained:

In children, we often equate innocence with *ignorance*. We don't want them to have to know about "adult" topics. But unfortunately children are at risk of pornography exposure from a young age. Keeping them ignorant of those dangers means they have no way to protect themselves from their own curiosity!



Become the expert for your kids

It's hard to believe that by age seven your little one is starting to express more independence. Social interactions occur more frequently through school and playdates. For many kids at this age their access to the internet is expanding.

That said, every child has different needs. So don't fret if you haven't started having these conversations yet (I was a late bloomer). Today is always a good day to start!

Talking in age appropriate ways about love and sex in your child's formative years establishes a safe place for your kids to talk as they grow up and have more sophisticated questions. If your kids learn to see you as the expert today, they will trust you as the expert tomorrow too!



PUMPKIN MUFFINS

Ingredients:

- 13/4 cups of flour
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 Tbsp. cinnamon (I personally add WAY more)
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin puree
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1 Tbsp. milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla


Directions:

- Preheat oven to 375°F. Line a muffin tin (12 muffin cups) with paper liners (or grease with butter).
- In a bowl, add and stir together all the dry ingredients.
- In another large bowl, add the eggs and whisk them with a fork. Add the pumpkin puree, canola oil, milk and vanilla. Stir until smooth.
- Add the dry ingredients into the wet ingredients mixing the batter until it is smooth.
- Spoon the batter into your muffin tins (it should fill 12 muffins cups).
- Bake for 25 minutes. (Note: This recipe makes 12 regular-size muffins or about 40 mini muffins.)







Fellowship Club, October 2023
