
Don't Make Big New Year's Resolutions. Focus on Tiny Trajectory Setting Habits.



It's the New Year and that brings with it the cultural liturgy of New Year's resolutions. Perhaps you have participated with liturgical responses like this:

- I'm going to lose weight this year.
- I'm going to get my house organized.
- I'm going to get out of debt.
- I'm going to read the whole Bible this year.
- I'm going to read more this year.

It's a funny liturgy because we all know that, depending on what data you consult, between 80 and 90 percent of these resolutions fail. And yet we religiously make them. And yes, I use the words *liturgy* and *religiously* intentionally. These almost certainly doomed-to-fail resolutions seem to arise from an innate conscientious voice calling from deep within us to better ourselves, a deepdown voice urging us to be virtuous. So we do obeisance to the idea of virtue by making high-sounding resolutions, even if we are almost certain that we will not follow through with them, because to admit that we have no concern to achieve virtuous living would seem to counter this moral sense hardwired in us.

If space allowed we could more fully explore this virtuous voice calling to us to better things. Where

else but from the source of virtue, our Lord Jesus Christ who created us, would this voice come? Surely it has not come from the monkeys Darwinists claim as our distant progenitors. No one has ever witnessed them at the turn of the New Year purchasing gym memberships, making budgets, or giving conscientious consideration to their calorie intake. Such reflective meditation could drive us to a place of greater wisdom concerning the human person (and the moral voice God planted within him), his condition (the inability to be virtuous), his need (a Savior to deliver him from his moral failings), and the hope made plain in Jesus.

But that will have to wait for another article because we need to discuss how to make positive and lasting changes in our lives, how to flip the percentage from almost certain failure, to a sure path to success. Let's start by scrapping New Year's resolutions. No, I'm not suggesting we simply quit trying to achieve positive change in our lives. I'm acknowledging that New Year's resolutions don't work. They have an 80 to 90 percent failure rate! Why would we, year after year, attempt something with that kind of failure rate? Isn't that the definition of insanity?

You might be thinking, but what other option is there? If this is the best option on the table, then even though it has such an abysmal success rate, it's better than doing nothing. But here's what I want you to appreciate: It's not the only option on the table. There's a much better way to make positive changes in your life and it actually starts with very small changes.

Let me start with a resolution that Christians often make: I'm going to read the whole Bible this year. It's a wonderful goal. Truly, reading the whole Bible is a goal all Christians should have. And yes, some people successfully do it in a year, but most

don't. So, most end up discouraged and defeated because they fell short of their goal. And do you know what most people do when they feel discouraged and defeated? They give up! They quit reading their Bibles. They tried it. It was too hard. So, they quit. And this feeling of defeat stays with them for years so that they are very hesitant ever to try reading their Bible again. Nobody likes feeling defeated. So, better not to try than to experience defeat again.

Are you ready to consider a different way? Stop focusing on the goal and start enjoying the journey. The point of reading your Bible is not how much you get through in a year. The point is fellowshipping with Jesus in the act of reading it. Reading plans can be wonderful (and DCE Kathryn has a great reading plan that some are working through), but the point isn't being able to say that you read the whole book (which is a point DCE Kathryn has repeatedly made). The point is the act of reading itself. The point is hearing your Lord speak in His Word and better knowing Him.

So, instead of fixating on the arbitrary goal of reading the whole book, and experiencing the disappointment that goes along with falling behind or not completing it, enjoy the journey. Enjoy every minute you spend in the Word. And don't set up unreasonable benchmarks – *I'm going to read a chapter a day*. That may work for you, but it all

likelihood, it won't, because life happens. Instead, establish a regular time block in your week (it may be every day, it may not be) that you are going to spend enjoying the Word. Anchor this time to something else (your morning coffee, your evening devotions, your lunch break, something is already present and habitual in your life).

Pay attention to what I'm suggesting. Don't fixate on an arbitrary goal; focus on the process. Don't obsess about a distant destination; enjoy the way there. And guess what? You're more likely to get there and to enjoy the way there!

Let's take another example: I'm going to lose <u>fill in the blank</u> pounds. This may be a fine goal. And you may make a gangbuster go at achieving it. But what typically happens? Life. You get a cold. You have multiple birthday parties where you indulge more than you intend to. You are up late from a ballgame and are, therefore, too tired to exercise. So you don't reach your goal. You're frustrated, discouraged, and defeated. So what do you do? You give up. And what do you do when you give up? Eat.¹ And the goal only gets farther away.

Are you ready to consider a different way? Stop focusing on the goal and start enjoying the journey. Stop fixating on an arbitrary pound number. Instead, celebrate every day you complete a 20 minute walk. Find some way to

God above all things." If you're turning to food for comfort, relief, and release, are you fearing, loving, and trusting food more than God? From where does your comfort come? From where does your help come? From where does your security come? And, remember, you are your habits. You may answer these questions one way in your mind, but it is your habits that demonstrate the truth. So to lose weight you may need to hear and heed the call to repentance for making food your god.

¹ This would take us too far afield from our purposes in this article, but we must acknowledge the spiritual component in play here. What are you turning to for comfort, relief, and release? Often it's food. And while food is a wonderful gift from God that is right and good to enjoy, it is a very bad god. As a god it over-promises and under-delivers, which is what all false gods do. So, a part of your journey with weight loss may need to include repentance. Martin Luther writes in his explanation to the First Commandment (You shall have no other gods) that we are to "fear, love, and trust in

make it significant. Put a sticker on your calendar. Cross it off your list every time you do it. Mentally congratulate yourself. Don't start off trying to do 20 pushups or 30 crunches. Do one. Then celebrate it. Do one every day for a week. Then celebrate it. Then add very slowly. Add to your walk. Add to your workout.

But this is key: celebrate the journey. The point here is not to fixate on a goal, but to enjoy the journey that leads to it. You are far more likely to achieve positive change in your life (and to arrive at healthy and wise destinations) if you can learn to enjoy and to celebrate the journey. I'm happy to share my personal journey in this, but I want you to know that understanding what I'm sharing with you has been transformative for me.

Maybe you want to expand your mind and your ability to confess Christ to your family and friends. That's a wonderful goal, but it's nearly impossible to achieve. It's not that you can't expand your mind and your ability to confess Christ; it's that the goal doesn't actually exist. In other words, there's no finish line. There's no way for you to objectively measure when you're actually reached your goal. And races with no finish lines are impossible to complete. At some point you will get tired and quit. And you will think that you're just not able to read or confess Christ intelligently.

Instead of setting yourself up to run a race with no finish line, challenge yourself to read one book that I or Kathryn recommend throughout the year. Just read one book (You could start with Atomic Habits by James Clear or You are What You Love by James Smith, both excellent books on habits!). Even if it takes you three months, read one book. And then celebrate it. Celebrate it by telling someone about it. Invite a friend over and tell them about it. Call me or Kathryn and tell us about it. In fact, don't wait until you finish it. Start telling

people about it as you're reading it. The important thing is the trajectory you are setting for your life, the habit you are establishing of reading, thinking, and talking about it. This is how you expand your mind and your ability to confess Christ. If you set the trajectory and enjoy the journey you will discover one day, much to your surprise, that you have arrived at your destination.

What I have shared in this brief article applies everywhere in your life. It's not the big goals that make us; it's the tiny changes and tiny course corrections we make that make us into competent and joyful people. James Clear (mentioned earlier) compares it to the tiny course adjustments pilots make when flying. A one degree adjustment applied over a long flight makes a major difference in their destination. The same holds true for you. The tiny course adjustments that you make and keep over the long haul make major differences in the outcomes you experience.

But these tiny course adjustments need to be made wisely. Don't try to master 10 different habits simultaneously. Tackle one or two. Get good at them. Then add one at a time. And this is key: celebrate when your system is working. Enjoy the process that you establish.

It's time to give up the doomed-to-fail New Year's resolutions and time to focus on tiny habits to help us set a better, more joy-filled trajectory for our lives





Because He Lives!!

"I do not envy parents these days!" "I would not want to be raising my kids now adays, the world is just getting out of

control." "I can't imagine having to parent a teen in today's culture." "There are so many more things to worry about now-a-days, then when I was raising my children." These are all phrases I have heard in the last few years from so many different people, spoken in so many different circumstances, regarding so many different cultural topics, or wars, or ideas. And trust me I've thought these things from time to time myself.

From gender ideology, to smartphones, pornography, war in Ukraine and Israel, cost of living increasing, the rise in depression and suicides. The list goes on in on. In fact, I often thought that I would be those women in the Bible that was "Woe to those women who are pregnant at the end of times..." and then I got pregnant with our first and the world literally shut down in 2020 due the pandemic. Followed by formula scarcity, fear around sicknesses and group gatherings, and so much more.

Honestly, it's no wonder these words are spoken often by so many of us. It's no wonder we worry about the world we are raising our children in. But God!

Oh! How this is one of my favorite phrases to come upon in scripture! But God! But God's ways are not our ways. But God's timing is not our timing! But

God has a plan for us and all things work to His glory for the good of those who trust in Him.

God knew when you would be born, he knew the parents you would be born to, or the family you would be adopted into. He knew the siblings you would have, the decades you would walk through. And the same is true for your children, and your children's children.

I often think that every generation has these thoughts and sentiments and this morning while perusing one of my books on the history of various hymns I realized that this is true. While the hymn *Because He Lives*, by William Gaither, is not in our LSB it is a rather well-known hymn made popular during the Billy Graham revivals. I fell in love with singing the hymn due to it being on Carrie Underwoods' new Gospel album from a few years back, and I wanted to share what Gloria Gaither wrote regarding why they wrote this hymn.

When Bill and I started our family in the sixties, racial tensions were tearing the country apart. Civil rights activists had suffered and some had been killed. The Vietnam conflict was claiming thousands of live, and tensions boiled over on university campuses. Many young people were growing disillusioned and "dropping out."

In this climate, Bill and I sought to write songs with lasting answers to the turmoil of the human spirit. But in the fall of 1969, several things happened to test the reality of our own convictions. We realized we were expecting another baby. Though we had always intended to have another child, we weren't planning on a baby so soon. My body hadn't quite recovered from the last pregnancy. Making matters worse, Bill contracted mononucleosis, which left him exhausted and depressed.

This combination of national turmoil and personal trouble discouraged us, and we occasionally asked each other, "If the world is like this now, what will it be in fifteen or sixteen years for our baby? What will this child face?"

While pondering and praying about these things, we came to realize anew that our courage doesn't come from a stable world, for the world has never been stable. Jesus Himself was born in the cruelest of times. No, we have babies, raise families, and risk living because the Resurrection is true!

Our baby arrived safe and sound, and we named him Benjamin, which means "most beloved son." A few weeks later "Because He Lives" was born in our hearts and poured from our souls:

How sweet to hold our newborn baby And feel the pride and joy he gives; But greater still, the calm assurance---This child can face uncertain days because He lives.

Over the years this song has reassured us that our Lord's Resurrection is the central truth of life. Because He lives, we can face tomorrow. Many times since, as our children grew, our business-life changed, our fortunes shifted, or our direction clouded, our family has found assurance in this very personal song.

It is "our song," but we're grateful others have loved it, too." –Gloria Gaither

Our world is unstable, and it always has been because of sin. Yet, because He, Jesus, lives we can face tomorrow. Because He lives, we have babies, raise our children, trust in His steadfast unchanging love for us. Because He lives, we can trust that He has called us by name, that we are

His. That we were called to live at this time, to face the lies of this age, the wars, the famine, the turmoil, the fear. And to remember that our God is not dead. Our God was born, lived the perfect life we could not live. Died the death that we desired, and rose again. Our God is alive! And because of that it changes everything.

Jesus: Intelligent Designer & Remarkable Repair Man

I've written before in these pages on the brilliance of our Lord Jesus Christ on display in the works He has made,² a brilliance that only gets brighter the more we learn about the intricacies of His creation, especially as we come to a deeper understanding of the inconceivably complex specified information in the DNA and throughout the cell. In this article we will again stand amazed before our Lord Jesus because we will see Him not only as the astonishing intelligent Designer He is, but as the remarkable repair man He has revealed Himself to be in the inner workings of the cell.

Journey with me into one of your 30 trillion cells (Yes, 30 trillion!). Inside each is a city of order and purpose. The cell membrane.

like a city wall, regulates with astonishing precision what enters and exits the city (efficiently getting the nutrients in and the waste products out). The nucleus houses your DNA, the blueprint for building you and the instructions for synthesizing proteins. Proteins are amazing and essential for life. They provide structural support for cells, act as enzymes to facilitate digestion, metabolism, and DNA replication, serve as Uber drivers to transport molecules like oxygen throughout the body, function as hormones to

regulate physiological processes, work as antibody bodyguards to neutralize threats from viruses and bacteria, operate traffic signals to regulate growth, development, and cell differentiation, and govern muscle movement, and much, much more!

The mitochondria are the powerhouses in the cell that produce its energy (called *ATP*) through a process called *ATP Synthase* (a high-tech micromolecular power generator that is one of the wonders of the molecular world). And we've said nothing about the ribosomes, the vacuoles, lysosomes, Golgi Apparatus, and so much more!

Jesus designed all of this!

Now recall what we highlighted last month about the cascading challenges engineers face in the design process.³ Last month we detailed the numerous bodily systems, from the respiratory to the GI to the cardiovascular and more that are needed to get oxygen to your cells. Recall what we highlighted: Each of these systems (plus more) are needed simultaneously to overcome the cascading challenges the cell faces to get oxygen (and to keep you alive). A step by step process of evolution won't do. You'd be dead long before all the systems had evolved. In other words, Darwinian evolution is ill-equipped to accomplish this.

The cell faces something similar inside its wall because all of the things the cell needs for life (sunlight, oxygen, and water) are also a threat to it if not regulated properly. And this says nothing of harmful things like ionizing radiation, gamma rays, and more that threaten your cells. Given this reality, the cell needs a way to identity and repair

the damage that will be done. Note this: the damage that will be done. Further, the cell must have all of these recognition and repair systems in place simultaneously or the cell will die (and so will you).

Process this: Every day in each one of your 30 trillion cells your DNA experiences 10,000 lost single letters in its code.4 Every day oxidation causes 10,000 instances of damage in every one of your 30 trillion cells. Every day each cell experiences 55,000 single DNA strand breaks and 10 double strand breaks. If these don't get repaired, your DNA will collapse into an unrecoverable death spiral... and you will die. And, yet, despite these deadly events cascading through your cells at breakneck speed, you're alive. How is this possible? Because the Lord Jesus knows the cascading challenges your cells face and He has planned for it. In fact, the Lord Jesus has specially created precisely calibrated molecular machines in your cells to recognize the damaged DNA, recycle what can be reused, repair what can be repaired, and keep you alive. It's truly astonishing. So just as fast as things are falling apart in your cells, these marvelously designed machines are putting everything back together.

In this article we'll detail only the simplest of the many recycle and repair operations happening in your body at dizzying speed every second of every day. It's called *Base Excision Repair*. Here's how it works (in exceedingly simplified language so we can understand it!). A single letter in your DNA code⁵ gets damaged. One of these wouldn't be a big deal, but if they accumulate (and they will), you will die. But the Lord Jesus knows this so He has equipped your cells with a protein machine (an

enzyme called Uracil DNA Glycosylase) whose job, like a 24/7 security guard in your cell, is to scan the DNA strand in search of these damaged letters. When it finds one, it removes it (like a dentist pulling a diseased tooth) and leaves the rest of the letters intact. That's impressive in itself. How does it know? Molecules don't have brains or eyes and yet it is able to identify and remove damaged single DNA letters so that the next machines can replace it.

After this machine drags the degraded letter away, another protein machine (Endonuclease IV) comes to that precise spot on the DNA strand and delicately slices open the DNA backbone. A third machine (RecJ Exonuclease) arrives and slices the DNA strand again to open the now-missing letter space. A fourth machine (Polymerase A) then arrives with the precise replacement letter and the necessary DNA backbone and inserts them into the opening. (This is amazing! It knows what letter is missing and where to put its replacement!) Finally, a fifth machine (Ligase A) welds the replacement part to the DNA backbone. And this happens every day thousands of times over in every one of your cells!

How do these machines know? And how do they know in what order to do their work? There are five different machines. They not only have to "know" their job, but they have to "know" the order in which they are to do their job. Words escape me! This is microscopic surgery, but it's more: It's microscopic surgery while the cell is running! This is like replacing the timing belt on your SUV while it's running! Are you amazed?

Story Short. I highly recommend you watch this entire series. It's fascinating, but it's witty, too.

Are you ready for it to get more amazing? Think about this: The cell needs these micro machines to keep it alive and it needs them right from the get-go. If they aren't up and running immediately, the cell will die due to the DNA death spiral we mentioned earlier that would result from the degradation that happens thousands of times a day. So, to keep the cell from dying the cell has to build these five highly specialized micro machines, but there's no way it can build these machines without having these very machines in place to identify, repair and/or replace the degraded DNA letters that are happening thousands of times a day. In other words, to build the recognition and repair micro machines, the cell needs the recognition and repair micro machines. Do you see the problem?

This is just one of the innumerable paradoxes scientists have discovered inside your cells. And, remember, building them step by step via Darwinian evolution won't work. The cell and the recognition and repair machines must be present and functioning simultaneously. This does not happen on its own. Nature isn't this smart. Nature doesn't have a mind. But Jesus does! And He knew exactly what was required to keep your cells and you alive. And we are privileged to live in an era where we are discovering how He programmed our cells to work.

Ready for one more marvel in your cells? Inside everyone one of your 30 trillion cells are amazingly sophisticated manufacturing machines called ribosomes (each cell has from thousands to millions ribosomes). These mighty machines receive the coded information (the assembly instructions) from the DNA and they run it along an assembly line on and by which proteins are assembled. If you've forgotten all the amazing things proteins do, go back and review the list I detailed at the beginning. To say that ribosomes are important would be the understatement of a

lifetime. Without ribosomes you wouldn't have proteins and without proteins you wouldn't be alive. It's that simple. Quite literally, your life depends on ribosomes.

But I have some bad news. Sometimes they get clogged. When this happens, the protein machine it's building can't be completed. If your cells didn't have some way to fix this problem, you know what would happen: You would die. Fortunately your Lord Jesus created more molecular machines to identify the problem, recycle the parts that got stuck on the assembly line, and get the ribosome running again. This is absolutely mind-boggling! Floating around in your cells are these little demolition and recycling machines. This is amazing! In fact, 1 in 20 of the molecular machines in your body are for destroying the other 19! And this is good! And they know (again, how does a molecule know?!) which ones to recycle and repair.

What's more amazing, they do it through a complicated marking system where one molecular machine comes on the scene and marks the half-finished/defective protein on the ribosome assembly line with a label called a degron. Another machine comes along and cuts it up – like a chainsaw! – and then others take parts for recycling or to an ejection hatch in the cell to dispose of them (and it knows what parts can be recycled and what parts can't!). You've seen city crews mark trees with an orange x for the tree crew to cut and haul away. This is happening in your cells thousands upon thousands of times every day.

How can we not break out into rapturous doxologies of praise to our Lord Jesus Christ?! He not only is The Intelligent Designer; He's the world's most remarkable repair man!


