## Believing and Speaking the Resurrection into Our Suffering

Tucked into Paul's second letter to the Corinthians are two verses of profound significance for Christians journeying through affliction and suffering. They're worth memorizing. Paul writes,

Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, "I believed, and so I spoke," we also believe, and so we also speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence (2 Corinthians 4:13-14).

Paul begins by anchoring his confession (and the confession of his co-confessors of Christ) in the faith of God's Old Testament people (notice the quotation marks, Paul is quoting Psalm 116:10). As we'll see, this is hugely significant. I have included verses 10 and 11 below to give a fuller sense of what the psalmist is saying:

I believed; therefore I spoke, but I was brought very low.

I, I said in my alarm, 'Every person is a liar.'1

Now, let me flesh it out a bit (bringing the fuller context of the psalm to bear). He's saying, "I believed (in the goodness and mercy of God to deliver me) even in the midst of my affliction and suffering. I didn't abandon my faith in God. In fact, I spoke confidently of my Lord. I despaired of man – they're liars! – but I kept my trust in the Lord."

The Apostle Paul reaches back into this text and pulls it into his present context (thereby showing us how to lasso Scripture and bring it into our

contexts). Paul had experienced great affliction (see the verses referenced below) and he found solace and solidarity in the confessed faith of the saints who had gone before him. What's happening here is really important to appreciate. Paul is showing us that Christ-confessors (i.e. Christians) share the same faith as the Old Testament saints. We worship the same God. We confess the same Lord. We celebrate the same promises. The only difference is that the Old Testament saints looked forward to the fulfillment of God's promises in Christ. We look back to them (even as we too look forward to those yet to be fulfilled in the Last Day resurrection).

Paul begins his letter to the Corinthians by sharing the severity of the suffering he and his companions had endured:

For we do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the affliction we experienced in Asia. For we were so utterly burdened beyond our strength that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death (2 Corinthians 1:8-9).

It was so bad that they despaired of life. Maybe you've been there. Maybe you've gone through deep affliction or dark suffering. Maybe you're going through it now – a betrayal, a diagnosis, a tragedy, a financial blow, a mental break. What do you do when the darkness comes? That's the question Paul is answering.

So he writes, "Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what has been written, 'I believed, and so I spoke,' we also believe, and so we also speak..." In other words, because we share the same faith as God's Old Testament saints, we make the same bold confession of confidence in our Lord. What is Paul's confession?

[We know] that he who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into his presence.

Paul is shining the blazing light of God's gospel promise in Jesus into his darkest moments and encouraging us to do likewise. He's saying, "Here, friend, bring this light into your shadowy sorrows. It will give you hope." So he confidently asserts, "We know..." He doesn't say, "We hope, we wish, we think this might be the case." He says, "We know." Just like the psalmist, Paul is speaking confidently of God's goodness and of his certainty in God's saving actions. And Paul sees those saving actions clearly displayed in the resurrection of Jesus and its implications for us.

Paul is confident that the same God who raised Jesus will raise believers in Jesus too. In fact, Paul saw how God used his suffering (and how He uses ours) to point us to this reality. Just after Paul finished sharing how he thought he and his companions had received the sentence of death (see verses referenced above), Paul asserted, "But that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead" (2 Corinthians 1:9). So here in chapter 4, he reiterates this certainty: We know that the God who raised Jesus is going to raise us too! This is a tremendously powerful confession.

But look what Paul adds to it. He is confident that when God raises him and the Corinthian Christians (and us), that God is going to "bring us with you into his presence." There's so much hope packed into this! In addition to being raised in imperishable, glorified, powerful, and Holy Spirit empowered bodies (see 1 Corinthians 15:42-44), Paul is confident that God is going to bring believers together. In other words, there's a great reunion coming! Those who have confessed Christ and have been separated by death are going to be reunited. Parents, children, spouses,

siblings, friends – we are going to be reunited – and Jesus is going to be there with us. Having been at Zion 14 years, I have stood at the graveside and wept with many of you. We have grieved our dead together, but think about what Paul is saying: In the resurrection we will be able to celebrate our reunion together! Doesn't this make your heart soar with hope?

But there's another promise baked into Paul's confident confession of Christ. Look at his pronouns: *us* and *you*. Paul has specific people in mind, people he knew personally and cared about. Here's why that's important: God isn't going to raise generic, identity-less people. He's going to raise specific people who have confessed Christ, people you know, people for whom you care deeply.

Here's the point: Paul is assuming our identities are retained in the resurrection. You are going to be you forever. Your loved ones are going to be your loved ones forever. The things that make you unique and beautiful and the things that make your loved ones unique and beautiful will be redeemed and be shot through with the glory of God. In the resurrection we won't lose our identities — we will lose our sin nature! — but our identities will be retained even as they are glorified and made more beautiful by Christ.

This is the promise Paul is exhorting us to lasso into our present darkness. He knows exactly how deep the darkness can get – he was there! – but he also knows that because Jesus has risen from the dead and is coming back to raise us too, the darkness is not eternal. Life and light in Christ are. This is why Easter means so much to us. It is God's emphatic declaration and promise that He has and will banish the darkness and bless us with life and light forever. Believe and speak this into your suffering. – Pastor Conner

eason also, since the day we heard of it, we have not ceased to pray for you and to ask that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding," Colossians 1:9

"We give thanks to God always for all of you, making mention of you in our prayers;" 1 Thessalonians 1:2

I prayed for you! Such sweet words. To pray for someone, to intercede for them to God is one of the greatest gifts we can give someone, and it is one of the greatest Christians virtues we can aspire to grow in. We have all been there when we have asked friends and family members for prayer. Maybe in times of our deepest needs or our hardest hurts.

Who in your life is a prayer warrior for you? Who prays for you without ceasing? Is there someone? Maybe over the years it was a grandma or grandpa. Maybe a mother or father. Or maybe a co-worker or fellow Bible study member. Who in your life have you been a prayer warrior for? Who have you prayed for without ceasing, always remembering their name in your prayers? Your sister, child, God-child, neighbor, friend who doesn't believe? Do you enter the throne room of God praying for others often? Or is that a discipline that needs to grow?

As Christians it is clear that we are called to pray without ceasing, yet, at times we can feel discouraged from God's answers of "no", or "not yet." There are times it is literal years of praying the same thing for the same person over and over. Lord, bring this person to faith in Christ Jesus. Yet,

it hasn't happened? Lord, heal this servant in Christ Jesus? Yet the healing never comes.

And so we tire and fatigue. We go weary and heavy laden. And still we take it to the Lord in prayer. Because there is power in prayer, and we are called to pray. To follow Christ's example in prayer.

So, how do we remain steadfast in prayer? How do we grow this spiritual skill? Why even bother? First let me give you a few tricks and tips I've learned over the years by watching some of my faith fathers and mothers pray and how I've increased in my own prayer habits and then let me give you a few personal stories of how prayer has affected my life.

#1 Make prayer a daily habit: I've learned to make it a daily habit. Upon awakening before grabbing my phone I thank God for three things. It's not always the same three things but it's three things nonetheless. On days where I remember to do this it helps set my mood and trajectory for the day. I also close the day in prayer. And this was a habit instilled in me by my parents. They taught me to pray before meals and before bed. For years my bedtime prayers were the same, the prayer they taught me. Now my bedtime prayers are not just me by myself but they include praying with my boys, and with my husband John. It's a time to pray together and thank God for each other, our family and all our blessings.

In years past I would use my commute to pray. This worked better in the big city where your commute time isn't just 5 mins across Manning. But finding time in your day to add prayer, while you drive, shower, get ready, or like Martin Luther, every time you wash your face you remember your baptism and thank God for faith in Christ Jesus. Adding prayer into your daily already routine tasks makes it simpler to remember and easier to pray without ceasing.

#2 Prayer Journaling. Another trick I've learned over the years is prayer journaling. I started this after receiving my first purple diary with a beautiful gold lock and tiny key in elementary school. I remember writing a "Dear Diary" in my first few entries and thinking how silly to write to a diary when I could write to God who actually would hear me. So I changed from "Dear Diary" to "Dear God". And thus began my years of prayer journaling.

This discipline has come and gone with life's hectic pace, but I love going back over past prayer journals and rereading what past Kathryn prayed for and seeing the fingerprints of God answering those prayers in ways I never even noticed at the time.

#3 Prayer Prompts or Books on Prayer. I have friends who keep lists of people to pray for, and prayer prompts to help them pray over their children, spouse and family. It means the world to receive a text from one of my prayer warriors telling me her exact prayer for me that day! And it's amazing how most days it's exactly what I need. For example, one day she was praying for God to help me be a great mom with patience and virtue to raise my boys, etc. etc. And I literally was struggling that morning with patience and my own emotional regulation and her prayers were just what I needed. God is good! A few of the books my friend uses to help her pray that have been on my to get list are, Praying for Your Adult Children, Praying for your Husband, The Power of the Praying Wife, and Today's Light (from CPH publishing).

#4 Praying Scripture. Praying through the scriptures. Praying through the psalms or while you read your daily Bible, is truly eye opening. Using the Lord's Prayer to pray for someone specifically. Using scripture to meditate and pray throughout the day. Start with your favorite Bible verse or Psalm.

#5 Sharing with other's your answered prayers. One last way I think we can grow in prayer as a spiritual discipline is to be quick to share with others all the ways we have seen God answer prayer in our lives. The yeses, noes or not yets. Being quick to tell others how prayer has changed us, shaped us and grown us in Christian virtue. Encouraging one another!

So, let me leave you with two stories of encouragement of how God has answered prayers in my life. Because there is power in prayer! Because we are called to pray without ceasing. Because our God is a God who hears. His ways are not our ways, His answers are not our answers. But God is still God! He is always good! And He is faithful! So, we pray.

So, I pray for that friend who does not have faith. I pray day after day, year after year that God would bring her to faith in Christ Jesus. That her heart would not be hardened like Pharaoh's. That God would bring back His prodigal daughter. This friend told me as I was going into ministry that she no longer believed in God. As you can imagine that made our friendship a bit strained over the years and we both respectively pulled away and the miles apart helped the process. Yet, I prayed for her. I would pray that I could be the light in her life of Christ when I would come back to visit. That she would believe. But also that God would send someone like her, a scientist, to show her the evidence for Christ. To refute what other worldviews had taken away. I figured it couldn't be me, and I'm not perfect, as you may know, so my prayers got a bit snarky at times and I prayed that God would send someone into her lab everyday simply to bring up the topic of God. I asked that she wouldn't be able to go one day without Jesus being brought up. And I prayed for that for a long time. Well, one Christmas while I was back we were driving together and she told me how there was this super annoying TA who was in her lab

every day and would talk to her about God and misquote scripture so she'd have to correct him. I literally laughed out loud and just let her keep telling her story. But inwardly I prayed thanking God he answered my prayers! It wasn't the big prayer of bringing her back to faith but it was seeds being sown. I still pray for God to do whatever it takes to bring his prodigal daughter to faith in Christ Jesus and I firmly believe one day I will get to celebrate that He has! For now, it's not yet. Yet, he still is active in bringing about redemption!

Lastly, it's not prayers I have prayed but prayers from a grandmother. My grandmother. As many of you know I was born with two heart defects and had open heart surgery at 10 months old. During that time my parents, grandparents, and so many others prayed for me. But it wasn't until 25 years later that I truly understood that they prayed... I mean prayed for me! The year I left to go into ministry I went to visit both grandparents to say goodbye. That day I learned the following. One grandma had her church do a 24 hour prayer vigil for me the day/night I had open heart surgery! I learned this while attending church with them and she asked her church to pray for me that day after reminding them how they had once prayed for me in the past. And they did, they prayed over me as I went off to go back to school to become a DCE. While visiting the other set of grandparents my other grandma walked into the kitchen that morning carrying a stack of very yellowed legal paper. She had written me the most beautiful poem as she prayed for me that summer I was born. She was in a writing class and wrote the poem for that class.

To this day I am in awe that we have a God who hears our prayers. That there is power in prayer. That God answered my grandma's prayers, my other grandma and her church's prayers, and my family's prayers with an astounding yes I will heal her! That my dad could say in the midst of my

heart failure that He trusted God wasn't done with me yet, and that God had big things for my life. It appears my dad wasn't wrong as 37 years ago this March 3<sup>rd</sup> I will celebrate what my family calls Happy Heart Day! The day God used the hands of physicians to heal my heart, I don't know if the medical team were believers. But I know that they were utterly covered in prayer the day they worked on me. And I thank God! So I leave you with the prayer poem of my Grandmother Maurine to me. May it encourage you in your own prayer life to grow in spiritual discipline, to journal, to pray every day without ceasing, to intercede for others because we have a God who hears our prayers! Thanks be to God!

"This was written for my granddaughter Kathryn. I'll give it to her when she is older. It took me all afternoon to write it and all evening to polish it."

I Prayed for You Kathryn Marie, I prayed for you. The news of your birth on May 9th Came to me as I finished noon duty. You were only a couple hours old When I learned you weighed 7lbs 11 oz. And Mom was so proud of your long dark hair. The next day was Saturday so Grandma & Grandpa drove to Mason City. We visited with Mom, Dad and Jennifer. "Do you want to see my sister?" Jennifer bounced down the hall Climbed up the viewing steps And announced to all "There's Baby Kathryn!" I, too, climbed the steps And knelt beside Jennifer And gazed in awe. Such beautiful long dark hair. "See my picture?" Jennifer asked. Her photo was taped to your bassinet. The hospital "Sibling Class" had planned ahead so you and Jennifer could become close friends. Then Dad told me of a slight heart murmur. Tests were scheduled for the morrow.

Kathryn Marie, I prayed for you.

Dad called Sunday evening after consultation

No hole in the heart or meningitis

Pneumonia was the diagnosis.

Your respiration and pulse were high,

Medication and tubes were prescribed.

Mom came home Thursday, very sad,

You had to stay a few more days.

And Jennifer went home with Grandma Hight.

Mom and Dad were all alone.

Kathryn Marie, I prayed for you.
The following Sunday, the news was worse.
You were flying by helicopter to lowa City, Your
pulse and respiration hovered at 200.
No on knew if you'd survive the flight

### Resources:

This month I have two tiny books to recommend! I want you to note that they're tiny but they are chocked full of great tips and information.

The first is entitled "The 4 Habits of Raising Joy-Filled Kids: A Simple Model for Developing Your Child's Maturity—at Every Stage" by Marcus Warner & Chris Coursey. This tiny book is a quick read and what I love most



about it is its easy application. The premise of the book is equipping parents with a tool box of skills that you can use with your kids to maturity and greater joy. Written for parents from infant through the teenage years it gives tips for helping regulate emotions, forming stable identity that doesn't change with each new emotion, learning to rebound or bounce back from difficulties, discovery values and virtues and not living to please other people, developing disciplines relationally, and correcting your kids with care. There are four basic habits they teach which is ABCD. Attune, Build Bounce, Correct with Care, and Develop Disciplines relationally. "Attunement is the art of reading your child's body language so vou can recognize their emotional state and meet them there." It is learning to listen for their emotions rather than listening to fix their problems. Next is "Build Bounce" and this is helping your kids learn the skills to recover from upsetting emotions or experiences. Third is Correct with Care. This where they help parents learn how to correct behavior in a way that keeps the relationship bigger than the problem. Wow, is that much easier said than done. And last but not least, is Developing Disciplines Relationally. The premise here is to help your kids reach their full potential by helping them learn important life skills. This is yes practical like learning to spell but also it's teaching them how to navigate failure, celebrate

successes, and that they're not alone in hard times. It's a quick little read and I highly recommend it as a book you come back to and brush off the dust on from time to time over the years of raising kiddos.

The second little book by the same guys is, "The 4 habits of Joy-Filled Marriages: How 15 Minutes a Day Will Help You Stay in Love, Brain Science Hacks that Boost Your Emotional, Spiritual and Physical



Connection." The description from Amazon is great so allow me to quote part of it. "What separates happy marriages from miserable ones? Surprisingly, it's not healthy communication, It's not conflict resolution skills. Its' actually the size of the marriage's joy gap. Joy gap is the length of time between moments of shared joy. When the joy gap gets bigger, problems are more likely to overwhelm you, resentment creeps in, and you start to feel distant and alone in your marriage. When the joy gap is smaller, you regularly feel connected and happy, problems feel manageable, and your marriage becomes a reliable source of joy. But how do you ensure that you're experiencing joy regularly?" The authors of the book studied relationships and neuroscience and discovered 4 habits. Each chapter concludes with 15-minute exercises to boost joy and retrain your brain to make joy your default setting. The 4 habits are play together, listen for emotion, appreciate daily, and nurture a rhythm. I love the brain science behind joy portion of this book and found both these tiny books quick reads but ones I will come back to for refresher courses. Because I don't want a life lived on auto pilot. I don't want to raise good kids, or have a good marriage. I want to raise great kids and have a great marriage filled with joy, laughter, and the ability to know that we are on this journey of life and sanctification together! - DCE Kathryn






### March Fellowship



Greetings from the "winter season" of the Dominican Republic with temperatures in the 70s and 80s! My first six months as a commissioned deaconess have been filled with travel, teaching and a good amount of learning. As of September, I was asked to become the Dominican deaconess mentor to our five deaconess students. This is the deaconess program through our DR seminary. Mentoring these students includes walking alongside these dedicated women who are in their second year of study (of three.) I also assist in teaching classes with pastors and deaconesses and am a liaison between the students, their pastors and the seminary. In the fall we taught an intensive class on the Divine Service while they also did their practical "fieldwork." Their practical work includes going on visits with their pastor, learning how to prepare the Lord's Supper, preparing a lesson to teach and more. Currently, I am co-teaching their Old Testament class alongside Pastor Krey. We just reached our halfway point in the class. Additionally, the deaconess program has expanded, and we currently have 71 women studying in nine different countries. Each country has a mentor and pastor that works with the group of ladies. We look forward to our next intensive later this spring on the Theology of Mercy.

LAC Travel & New Missionaries: Last fall I was able to see our missionaries in Belize (5 families), Peru Rico (4 families) and Uruguay (2 families.) It is always wonderful to connect with my fellow missionaries, hear about their families in person, and see firsthand the work and how the Lord is working in and through each of them. These visits are meant to support and boost our missionaries, check in with them and see if there are ways in which we can support them and their ongoing ministry. We also had a bit of a baby boom in 2023 for LAC – Five new babies were born (and one more on the way for 2024!) We praise the Lord for these new little missionaries and ask for continued health for each one. (William, Anaiyah, Elena, Matheo, and Ian.)

Short-term Volunteer: This fall I had a young woman, who is a nurse, come and shadow me for a week. She wanted to witness our work firsthand and see if it was where the Lord was leading her to serve. During the week she learned about what a human care coordinator does, as well as many of the other roles of missionaries in the DR. This opportunity is called "shadow a missionary." This is just one example on how you, dear supporters, can connect with us here in Latin America. However there are many ways to be an active part of the mission of the church; whether it's through sharing about our work, praying for us or contributing financially. Short-term Team: Each year we also have many short-term teams that come to a variety of our countries to be involved in different activities. From eye glass clinics and construction projects, to supporting youth retreats or Vacation Bible Schools there are lots of opportunities to become involved. We have many teams that also come down for what is called "mission education." These teams come specifically to the DR to learn about what mission is, meet our missionaries, get involved in local ministry and have the chance to see how the Lord is working in many many different ways. One of my favorite things about these teams is being able to share firsthand about the work and meet other mission minded people!

What a blessing it was to see five of the Lutheran congregations in Panama come together to celebrate after the church was restored. Many hours, hands and short-term teams sup-ported the restoration of this beautiful church. It was a blessing to see ~200 people worship and rejoice together. We pray that the Lord would continue to use His servants to reach out to the people of Panama.

### Upcoming

New Missionaries: The Lord has blessed us and we are excited to have three new families joining our LAC family later this spring/summer. Please keep the Weber, Stigdon and Shaver families in your prayers as they prepare to transition to the mission field. In addition to those three, another three families have received calls/appointments from the Office of International Mission and are in the deliberating phase. Please keep them in your prayers. All new LAC missionaries pass through the DR for on-field orientation before heading to their respective fields. As I run our on-field orientation, alongside our regional team, I look forward to hosting these families here soon! Orientation consists of many things but some of the overarching goals include: Language acquisition, learning how to learn a culture, establishing relationships with the regional team, and learning about the mission of the church and specifically about LAC.

#### Home Service:

As many of you know, I go on home service every 22 months. Home service is typically 6-8 weeks of reconnecting with mission partners [churches, schools, individuals] and updating them on the work here in LAC. Due to needs here in the DR, I'll be splitting my time this year. If you'd like to hear from me from April 19 – May 13, I'll mostly be in Indiana and Michigan.
